History. Be it on some grand, global scale or on a more personal, intimate level, history is a peculiar thing. I'm struck by the history of a mere 365 days.

As I write this, the impact of the last year seems more profound.

That is because I still find myself in the same place I was exactly 12 months ago: at a bull sale. Many of us can remember the last "normal" family trip we took, or the last routine business jaunt, or even the last time we routinely walked into church or into a high school sporting event. My last normal trip was to visit one of you. To spend time on that day when a great family shared a year's worth of hard work with their friends and customers. The annual bull sale. That sale in 2020 was by all measures an overwhelming success. The commercial clients invested well into genetics that will pay dividends for a decade and beyond. The bull selling family received the resources they needed to plow ahead in the journey to make their ideal bovine. And that very weekend, on that very trip home, things started to change.



You have endured a lot since then. We all have. We've experienced challenges, stress, and loss. We've witnessed things that even the most hardened among us wouldn't have predicted just a short time ago. Those likely felt distant at first. Twelve months ago, it was an uncomfortable watch on the news. Eleven months ago, it may have become unnerving and started to touch our lives. And then within weeks it started to change everything. The stresses of the last year . . . These too shall pass. I don't pretend to know how or when, but we will continue to lean into the time-tested, traditional approaches to life that have served mankind well. And somehow, someway, we chart our path. Situated with the rugged-plains landscape of Leeds, North Dakota, as a backdrop to their productive ranch and farmland, the Kenner Simmental Ranch produces profitable Simmental and SimAngus[™] genetics for their commercial customers.

Through their commitment to collecting data, implementing a progressive breeding program, and providing top-notch customer service, Roger Kenner and his daughter, Erika, develop a wide range of bulls proven to work for their customers and produce the carcass their customers' buyers want.

"We have a lot of customers who have different bull needs. As seedstock producers, we're not trying to tell our customers what they need," Roger shares, explaining that their customers are looking for a range of bulls from performance sires to heifer bulls. "We develop purebreds and composite Simmental and SimAngus in red and black. We try to put a range of well-built animals in our sale each year. Some of each category so as to make sure the customer has what their cow herd needs to be profitable."

Annually, the Kenners market and sell bred heifers to their customers.

Ensuring that the bulls they sell perform for their customers in the long term, the Kenners meticulously track herd data, complete DNA work, and only keep structurally sound bulls with good ADG numbers.

Built on Data and Performance

"While our area doesn't require as much pasture per animal unit, structure and soundness are huge for us and many of our clients," Erika says, describing how bull efficiency and longevity are factors in providing a quality animal to their customers.

The shift in the Simmental and SimAngus breed in the early 2000s provided more marketing avenues to commercial producers selecting for extra hybrid vigor. "Simmental went through a bad time," she explains, delving into the bad reputation Simmental had in the commercial industry in the late 1990s for hard calving and extreme frames. At a time when Simmentals weren't popular, SimAngus proved to the commercial industry how they work in a crossbreeding system. "They were also able to test the waters and we were able to prove we had improved the breed. Now many are seeing the benefits of the SimAngus female and like to make their own halfbloods."

The Kenners utilize both Simmental and Angus to develop bulls with calving ease and a manageable frame score. She continues, "In our environments, we have found our bulls to be the most efficient at a six-frame score. They'll put good pounds on their calves, cows will breed back, and they're coming in with good condition."



All cows are bred with one round of AI before being cleaned up with a high-quality bull. Kenner Simmental Ranch breeds 350 cows each year, and implants an additional 100 embryos in their own herd and about 120 more in a cooperator herd each year.

"We utilize ET and AI to take our herd where we want to be going more efficiently," Erika explains. A large portion of making breeding decisions is based on the data they are collecting on their cow herd and the carcass grading results from those genetics once they're on the rail.

"I have so many spreadsheets that it's actually kind of a joke around the ranch," she laughs. Everything from birth weights, weaning weights, yearling data, and carcass ultrasound to mature dam data is collected and used in their selection decisions. "When we're selling a bull, we will use phenotype and numbers to make selections. They need to measure up weight-wise because pounds still sell. They have to be sound, they've got to have easy fleshing ability. We also look at their EPD profile, feet, and disposition."

To ensure accurate EPDs, the Kenners actively report all phenotypes on the whole herd to their association. In recent years, they have participated in research projects to DNA test their entire cow herd and calf crop, called Cow Herd DNA Roundup and Calf Crop Genomics. She explains, "The DNA gives us a whole other level of accuracy that we haven't had before. Some of the trait accuracies are enhanced to an equivalent of more than 20 calves reported to a cow. That's huge when you're using EPDs to make selections."

Another benefit to the DNA testing is that all cows and calves are parent-verified. "By DNA testing our cow herd, we've guaranteed that what we're selling is exactly what we say it is," she explains.

Developing genetics for their buyers that will grade Choice while deliberately retaining balance in other traits is top priority. "At the end of the day, we believe in providing our customer a balanced animal," Erika says. "While we use EPDs and indexes, we're not just looking at one number or one index. We consider the big picture. We probably move the bulls along in the carcass value a little slower than others, but we refuse to give up everything else to get there." Each year, 60–70 steers are fed at Chappell Feedlot in Nebraska. After harvest, the carcass data is used to find areas of improvement. "We feel it's important as seedstock producers to know how cattle are grading because our clients are commercial cattlemen. They are all going to be selling steers to feedlots and we want to make sure that our genetics are really going to work."

Kenner shares that when they first started getting carcass data back, their cattle were grading 70% Choice, but after making adjustments to their breeding program, the cattle are now grading 90% Choice or higher. The data has been helpful in improving their bottom-end cattle, Kenner explains, "The cattle we're sending to the feedlot are our culls that didn't make the bull sale. Our calves aren't the perfect source to get carcass data back on because they don't represent what our customers would sell to a feedlot, but after years of doing this, we've made improvements in our whole breeding program."

Each spring, heifers are sorted before breeding for replacements and sale heifers. Their top- and bottom-end cows have gotten closer and more uniform in appearance, making replacement and sale selections more difficult. Remaining critical on their female side provides their customer with a female they can capitalize on. "Sometimes we joke that we sell some that we should have kept for ourselves, but because we're critical on data, calving in a 60-day window, we're okay that our customers take some better heifers as well," Erika says. *(Continued on page 20)*

One of the Kenner's first priorities is selecting structurally sound cattle that will perform in any environment.

Providing Impactful, Reliable Genetics

This past February marked Kenner Simmental Ranch's 25th anniversary bull sale. For many years, the family sold private treaty off the farm. When they discovered that hauling multiple semi-loads of bulls to Mandan and Bismarck was too cumbersome, they transitioned to hosting a sale each year.

In 2010, they built their own sale barn on the ranch, where they annually sell 120–130 bulls and 70 bred heifers in person and online. By incorporating the online sale option, their buyers have more flexibility during the unreliable weather in the beginning part of the year. Roger says, "We've also found that the risk of injury is much lower and it is a lot less stressful for the cattle on the day of the sale."

A large benefit to buying bulls from the Kenners is the sale guarantee. If the customer has any problems or concerns, the bull they purchase can be exchanged. To ensure that they can provide their customers with quality genetics in case of an accident, a few sale-quality bulls are held back to be available for buyers.

"We want 100% customer satisfaction," Erika says. "We keep the extra bulls around so that we can make sure that we can replace a bull if it gets injured. Accidents happen and we hope our buyers know that we will make sure they have a valuable, high-quality bull to breed with."



Diversified with a Great Crew

In addition to cattle ranching, the Kenners raise between five to ten different crops each year and are part-owners of a frozen food company. Much of the farming is small grains like spring wheat and barley, but they also grow corn and beans including black turtle, pinto, and soybeans.

"Believe it or not, our major business is our grain farming," Erika says, explaining that because of their climate and soil type they can produce a variety of crops throughout the year.

For the last 28 years, Roger has also been involved in the pasta industry. He was one of the founding board members for Dakota Grower's Pasta, a farmer owned co-op where local farmers contributed their durum to the plant. More recently, he is a part owner for a frozen-food company in Leeds.

For both the cattle and farm operation, the Kenners feel lucky to have employees that make their operation successful. Erika shares, "Labor is a major challenge for farmers and ranchers. Finding people who want to work on a cattle ranch, especially in northern North Dakota, is not always easy. We're fortunate to have a great crew that works with us, and they've been working with us for many years."

Along with the sale anniversary, 2021 marks the twenty-fifth year working with their herdsman Bryan Leapaldt. Leapalt lives on the ranch and manages all the daily operations and other employees. He also plays a large role in the breeding plans each year. Roger says, "Bryan is an essential part of our ranch for daily operation and providing customer service. He works with the customers just as much as Erika and I do."

At the end of the day, the Kenners feel successful when they know they've improved their customers' bottom lines. Erika concludes, "We understand that herd bulls have a large impact on our customers' breeding program for years to come. We do the homework for them. We help them minimize risks by providing a balanced, reliable Simmental and SimAngus bull to advance their herd."

National Classic Preview

The 2021 AJSA National Classic will mark the 41st year of bringing together young Simmental enthusiasts from across the country. The 2020 AJSA National Classic was set to be held at Fonner Park, but the unprecedented circumstances that came with the COVID-19 pandemic forced many changes, including a last-minute move of the event to Brookings, South Dakota.

The theme, "Grand Slam," is a nod to Grand Island, Nebraska, and the top-notch competition and education that will take place during the event.

The AJSA National Classic brings education to the forefront, with all participants being required to enter the educational contests. Additionally, the mentor-mentee program and other elements encouraging community and camaraderie have made the AJSA National Classic a one-of-a-kind event for young people in the beef industry. This year's competition will include educational contests and cattle shows, including showmanship.

The planning committee is headed by Diane Duren, who has coordinated two past AJSA National Classic events, in addition to two Regional Classics. Duren explains, "The AJSA offers youth the opportunity to compete in educational contests that prepare them for lifelong skills they need as they mature into adults."

Diane Duren, Rising City, Nebraska, has been the executive director of the Nebraska Simmental Association for the past 26 years. She grew up on a farm, raising pigs and cattle, in addition to farming many acres. Duren works for Foundation One Bank in Omaha as the IT



Director and Information Security Officer, as well as the Director of Marketing and Communications. Her husband, Jeff, has been employed by the Union Pacific Railroad for 42 years. Diane and Jeff are the proud parents of three daughters, and have four grandchildren. Duren takes on the unpaid but highly demanding job of coordinating the National Classic because she believes in supporting youth in the Simmental breed. She shares, "I have a passion for helping people, and love what I'm doing with the Nebraska Simmental Association, otherwise I wouldn't have been around this long. I love seeing kids at the age of eight years join the Nebraska Junior Simmental Association and AJSA and mature through the program. It's very rewarding to see them become contributing young adults in society. Most of these youth become very successful in life as a result of being involved. I've mentored kids through the program who are now returning with their own children here at the 2021 AJSA Classic, and it's so great to see second generation Simmental exhibitors."

Fundraising

Betsy Senter, founder of B&B Simmental, is a skilled cattlewoman, lifelong learner, and dedicated member of her community.

Betsy Senter

Betsy Senter was born and raised in Raleigh, North Carolina. "Both of my grandparents had farms. My dad's dad had a 220acre farm just south of Raleigh, and basically we grew up there. We were out there all the time, every weekend, and whenever something needed to be done. We ran cattle, and had a group of people we sold freezer beef to. That's how I

agriculture would play a role in her life, "I just liked working with animals. We had beef cattle around all the time, and my grandfather even used AI when it was first starting."

Senter grew up with the determination to do what she set her mind to, and after graduation and a few jobs, she accepted a position with the Farmers Home Administration in South Dakota in 1977. She attributes her drive to work to several influences, including her mom. "My mom was a legal secretary, and she was always one to say, 'you can do anything you want to.' Looking back, that was a big influence on me."

The move from North Carolina to South Dakota was big, but Senter settled into her professional role as well as the midwestern agricultural community. Her knowledge of agriculture and education allowed her to build relationships with her clients. "Later I became a loan manager at my own office here in nearby Winter, I was there for around 27 years, and kept a staff of around five people. We made guaranteed loans, direct loans, and serviced loans."

Senter retired in 2009, which allowed her to dedicate all of her time to the cow herd she had been building. She originally lived in town, but soon made it a point to find more space. She rented a farmstead, and was able to eventually buy her first piece of land. "I moved out here and slowly increased my cow herd. While I was working I was mainly doing it on the side." Upon retirement, she was able to focus on building a business along with her partner in the cow herd, Bonnie Noziska.

Simmental became an important part of this plan. "I went and bought my first three-quarter-blood Simmental bull in 1997 and haven't used anything else since. The docility and crossbreeding is what we were after. Then, the more we got into it, I just started paying more attention to the breed. I came to the realization that with land and machinery, we weren't going to be able to do quantity, so we decided to emphasize quality. We started slowly registering the cows and using AI."

Today, B&B Simmental markets 15 to 25 registered Simmental bulls to local customers. Science and a dedication to learning have remained important to Senter throughout her life, and Simmental has allowed her to dive even deeper into these things. B&B Simmental participated in Total Herd Enrollment, the Cow Herd DNA Roundup, and completes a genomic test on all of the bull calves and replacement heifers each year. Senter has attended many Fall Focus events and continues to learn about genetics and science. "The science and numbers, and trying to produce something that people can use for crossbreeding and help their genetics and improve the final product is what interests me."

Community and fostering youth involvement in agriculture are also extremely important to Senter. Through the local cattlewomen's group — the Rosebud Rancherettes — she helped get local beef into the school lunchroom, and, most recently, agricultural classes into the curriculum - including FFA. "We went to the school board meeting, and I said, 'We have some of the best cattle and agriculture in the country and we don't have ag in our high school."

Fostering an interest in agriculture is a priority for Senter. "I have a group of kids who go to school in Burke who work for me. There are five or six high-school boys, plus Morgan, who come out and work — we laugh because yes, it's crazy sometimes, but we enjoy young people, and I think we are giving back. It's one thing to work for your parents, and another to work for someone else."

Throughout her career, she saw it become increasingly difficult for young people to get a start in agriculture. She helped many get loans, and understands that due to the cost of land and startup, it can be almost impossible for someone to become involved without the help of family. "I think with these ranches and farms that are handed down, we need to figure out how to preserve them and help them be successful, any way we can, and attract young people into it."

As someone who found her way into the cattle business, Senter believes that it takes creativity and thinking outside the box to get started. "Make sure you can eat and live something that will pay the bills — and work your way into it. I don't think you can drop right in without assets that are already built up. Move back to these communities, become a part of them, and try to get into it slowly instead of borrowing a bunch of money. It doesn't have to be done overnight. Have a good support system with family or a neighbor who will help you."

Simmental Genetic Trends

Are Your Genetic Decisions Taking You in the Right Direction?

Each April, we set aside time and space in our magazine to look at the genetic trends of the purebred Simmental over the last 20 years. It's always interesting to take a step back from all the programs, publications, and other projects that occupy most of our days, and simply pause and see if everything we are doing is moving our members' cattle in the right direction. And by "we," I mean we. I view the community of the American Simmental Association's members, their customers, our board of trustees, and the staff at the ASA as a big team pulling in the same direction to improve the genetics available to the commercial beef cattle industry. Of course, the key to change and improvement lies with you, our members. We can provide tools, genetic predictions, and education about ways to improve genetics, but ultimately the members hold the power of the final decision. If the programs aren't a fit, they won't be used. If the genetic predictions don't align with what the membership thinks will be successful, they won't be used. Ultimately, the commercial relevance of our members' cattle is the highest priority for the ASA team, and decisions made to increase the commercial demand for our members' customers are at the heart of all the projects and programs happening at the ASA. In order to make sure we are all pulling in the right direction, here are the genetic trends of the purebred Simmental population over the last 20 years.

Before we dive into the genetic trends graphs, there are a few housekeeping items. These graphs are standardized so you can compare selection pressure directly from trait to trait. We set the year 2000 to zero so you can see the relative genetic change during the past 20 years, and how change in each trait compares during that time frame. The trends are only reflective of the purebred Simmental population, so do not include SimAngus[™], Simbrah, or Fleckvieh cattle. The graphs are broken into maternally and terminally focused traits based on year of birth of the animal.

In the maternal traits, there is an impressive balance in increasing calving ease, decreasing birth weights, increasing weaning weights, while decreasing milk and holding mature weight flat (suggesting a reduction in the cost to maintain the cow herd). Take a second to digest all that. It is NOT easy to move genetically correlated traits in opposing directions, yet this population has done exactly that.





The stayability EPD (predicting the proportion of daughters who stay in the herd and have calves annually until at least six years old) certainly increased, but in recent years looks a little more flat. I view the recent trend in stayability from two perspectives. On one hand, it's impressive to see so much change in so many traits in the right direction, all while keeping stayability in a positive trend (or at least not negative). On the other hand, the stayability genetic trend is something our members — our key decision makers — need to notice. If Simmental and Simmental cross cattle are to maintain high demand in the commercial sector, the daughters going into cow-calf herds need to stay and be productive. Fertility is the number-one trait tied to profitability in the commercial beef industry.

A challenging component of stayability is that it is a lowly heritable trait, meaning the environment plays a much larger role in the phenotype than the genetics do. As such, you can see phenotypes that don't match the genetic predictions for longevity. This does not mean the genetic predictions are wrong. The genetic predictions for lowly heritable traits are a much better way to select for the genetics of that trait than using a phenotype (heavily influenced by the environment). In other words, to make improvements in the genetic potential for cow longevity (or stayability), selection using the stayability EPD will make much faster progress than simply selecting on a phenotype (e.g., open/pregnant).

When we look at the genetic trends for the terminal traits, we also see positive movement in nearly all the economically relevant traits. Post weaning gain, carcass weight, and marbling are all increasing. We are starting to see an uptick in yield grade, which is not in a favorable direction, but given the breed's potential for yield, this is not a concern at this time.

The economic indexes also reflect the positive trends we see in these graphs. In the past 20 years, Simmentals have increased by 27% in the All Purpose Index (\$API) and by 26% in the Terminal Index (\$TI). This translates to an increase of over \$3,000 per bull when making replacement heifers and \$2,000 profit potential for terminal use sires.

Here is your moment to pause all of your busywork and think about whether the decisions you are making about your genetic offerings are taking you in the right direction. Do you have a clear focus for your seedstock program? Are you making decisions to support that area of focus? Are you participating in programs that help get the most accurate predictions possible? Is all your hard work and money paying off? Are you moving in the right direction?

When I sit back and reflect on what the Simmental breed has done in the last 20 years, I am impressed with what I see. Our members deserve a round of applause for the improvement of many economically relevant traits that are hard to improve simultaneously. I see a commitment from our breeders, our board, and our staff to develop programs and tools used to create genetics with commercial relevance and demand. I see these programs and tools leading us in the right direction, or we wouldn't see suchbalanced improvement in economically relevant traits. As you know, it takes years to see the results of beef cattle genetic selection. With more recent programs like the Cow Herd DNA Roundup, Carcass Expansion Project, and Calf Crop Genomics, I can't wait to see where the increase of data and data quality will take us next.

That was the day I decided to become a trustee. Watching that little girl overcome her fear and do so well in her first contest reminded me of myself when I started attending the National Classic. I remember the older exhibitors I admired, and how they had helped me improve over the years. My AJSA heroes were Jordan Cowger, Morgan Phillips, Koty Allen, Kylee Sigmon, and Jessica Smith. They were the exhibitors that I tried to be like. In reality, I should also be thanking that young mentee because she sparked that desire in me to be someone worth looking up to. I hope that my story empowers AJSA members to reach for their goals and make new friends. It is often said that every champion was once a contender who refused to give up. Board Updates AI Sire and Donor Dams Qualification Policy

Recently, Neogen[®] updated their mid-level genomic panel from ~50,000 SNPs to ~100,000 SNPs. In Herdbook, animals with the former genomic panel are denoted with a 47K or C47K for Cow Herd DNA Roundup (CHR) samples. The current updated genomic panel is denoted with a 100K in Herdbook (C100K for CHR and A100K for Calf Crop Genomics samples).

The ASA Board of Trustees recently approved the updated 100K genomic panel to qualify AI sires and donor dams. Animals with a completed 100K, C100K, or A100K panel will automatically qualify as a donor dam or AI sire. Animals with a completed 47K panel will not qualify and must be re-tested at the 100K level in order to become an approved AI sire or donor dam.

The genomic panel is now \$50 to approve an AI sire or donor dam; add-on options and prices remain the same. The 100K genomic panel continues to be ASA's recommendation for animals that will make a large impact in herds and is the only genomic panel with add-on pricing for coat color, horned/polled, and genetic condition panel. Please contact ASA's DNA Department with questions.

Herdbook Update to Birth Weight Ratio and Collection Method

The Board recently passed a resolution to change the direction of the ratio for birth weights so that larger ratios are assigned to animals with heavier birth weights in their contemporary group and vice versa. This resolution came about to standardize the direction of the ratios so that higher ratios uniformly mean more of that trait. Additionally, breeders can now indicate if they use hoof tape to estimate birth weight in Herdbook. There is a column called "BwMethod" next to the column where birth weights are entered in the animal entry page. If the weights were estimated using hoof tape, then simply put a T in the "BwMethod" column. If birth weights were obtained using a scale, there is no need to enter anything.

Tracked Shipping Recommended by ASA's DNA Department

ASA's DNA Department strongly recommends that members send all DNA samples in a tracked package. This can be through any carrier, so long as a tracking number is available. We also strongly suggest that kits are sent to members in a tracked package, as the extra cost can eliminate delays in regular USPS shipping, and also limit the chance of the package being lost in transit.

Priority shipping is the only way to cut down on the time it takes to get a sample tested, as there are no priority options at the lab. Upon arrival at the lab, testing takes three to four weeks, and additional time is often necessary for genomic panels to run through the evaluation.

ASA Launched Calf Crop Genomic Testing Project



Calf Crop Genomics is a recent program launched by the American Simmental Association in collaboration with Neogen[®]. Calf Crop Genomics offers a 50% off GGP-100K genomic test including parentage (\$25 compared to \$50 equivalent test) to participating breeders

who test their entire calf crop group. Genotyping entire contemporary groups is important to:

- 1. use genomically-enhanced EPDs (GE-EPDs) for selection decisions,
- 2. reduce selection bias in genomic predictions, and
- 3. increase the volume of genotyped animals for future improvements to genetic predictions.

The latter two points make any singular genomic test in the future better for all members using genomics.

Our Pioneers – Travers Smith



We ended the last piece about Travers Smith with his return to Canada from Switzerland by August 15, 1966. Before his departure, Travers spent the period from August 7 to 12 in Switzerland making contacts for the future that would eventually prove invaluable for direct importation from that country. In his own words, "Making arrangements for the future, contacting all the govern-

ments and exporters as possible, as well as veterinarians. My inquiries for top quality cattlemen in Switzerland to do a selection job for us in the future led me to two persons — Ernst Aegerter, who had for most of his life headed up the export of cattle out of Switzerland, and a Mrs. Ida Hofer, who was a real cattlewoman in her own right, being of a famous cattle breeding family and also married into one."

As he anxiously awaited the results from the quarantines underway in France for one of the three bulls he had selected, Travers continued contact with Aegerter and Hofer, trusting in their judgement for potential cattle to import. He was also trusting that the Canadian government would open to Switzerland in the upcoming year for direct importation. "This will prove a nail biting experience for these first Canadian Simmental believers and investors. When at last it seems too late, they will receive eight permits for France/Switzerland, dated July 19, 1967."

Travers' bankers were becoming reluctant to go along with his additional ideas and mounting costs. Deterred but not defeated, Travers had to finance "the Simmental gamble" with the help of several local investors who finally responded to his enthusiasm. On August 30, 1966, six of the eight initial contributors met to determine the type of organization they would need to transact the future business of the contributing group. Those present were "B. Travers Smith; Dr. Orson T. Bingham; Harold Watson; Guy Bowlby; H. J. Blackmore; B.Y. Williams." Dr. S.B. Williams and Franklin Smith were unable to attend. Each investor contributed \$500 in cash with a further \$500 guarantee to the bank to secure a \$4,000 loan. This gave the group \$8,000 in working capital. "Their Parisien venture will take most of it." On September 26, "Simmental Breeders Limited [AKA, SBL] is incorporated with B. Travers Smith, chairman, and B.Y. Williams, secretary with the remaining investors as directors."

On October 29, following a successful quarantine at Brest, France, "Parisien and 228 other imports (mainly Charolais) are loaded onto a cattle boat for the eight day voyage to Grosse-Ile, Quebec-Canada's quarantine facility in the Gulf of St. Lawrence. Here, Parisien will spend his first Canadian winter. (*Canadian Department of Agriculture letter of Sept. 15, 1966 states cattle imports authorized for 1966 total 229)." Parisien must have felt all alone being the only Simmental on board. However, it is worth observing that in history the power of one cannot be dismissed.

One more hurdle remained for Parisien. In the new year, he crossed onto the Canadian mainland to Alberta for his last quarantine phase, a 90-day period on Travers's ranch. According to Susan Smith's blog, "In Travers' view, things are looking up for every farm and ranch family in North America — every family, that is, who will lend him their ears and their eyes for even just a minute."

And that's the way it all started, the Simmental revolution that altered the trajectory of the beef cattle industry in North America: one man and one bull! There is undeniably a lesson here for us to take to heart. Travers' vision and relentless efforts to persevere are, indeed, a remarkable and inspirational story. Travers Smith personified the true spirit of a pioneer. He was, rightfully, the founder of our breed in North America.

A fitting conclusion by Susan Smith: "Those of you who remember Travers knew him as a man of deep faith. In a letter to his children in 1971, he wrote of the first Simmental trip, saying '... the Lord softened the heart of a customs man that I got a passport [brief] hours in Ottawa. He led me to the right people in Switzerland, in France; unbeknown to them He influenced men to organize trips for me to see cattle. He gave me ideas and understanding of Cattle and the attendant business far beyond my natural powers. In the past He prepared through men's management of Genetics, a Bull that started the biggest revolution for good in the cattle industry on this continent."

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Everything the AJSA Needs to Know About DNA Testing

With the upcoming AJSA Regional and National Classics, and summer show season, it is very important to be up to date on DNA requirements for registration. The deadlines in this article are specifically for the AJSA Regional and National Classics, but the general registration requirements serve as a good guide for all who will register animals for show season. Please pay close attention to the DNA timeline provided below. Remember registrations not completed by the member on Herdbook.org can take 3 – 5 days for ASA to process even after DNA results are uploaded. Registration applications can be mailed, faxed, or emailed to the ASA, but remember that registration process is independent of the DNA testing. It is recommended that your samples are sent to the lab using FedEx or UPS.

Reminder: there is no way to expedite the time it takes for DNA test results once the sample is at the lab.

- All animals resulting from the purchase of an embryo MUST be parent verified. There are no exceptions to this rule.
 WARNING: If an animal is purchased with the guarantee of registration/transfer by the seller, make sure the seller is aware of this requirement.
- ALL donor dams and AI sires are required to have an GGP-HD (150K or 100K) profile complete before their progeny can be registered. Ideally, ensure this requirement has been met prior to breeding cows, purchasing semen, flushing embryos, or purchasing animals to show.
 - If the sire or dam is of another breed, please request the breed association forward all DNA information to ASA's DNA department.
- If DNA testing is required, put the animal on file before requesting the testing. This step helps track the animal through the DNA process by providing a unique ID that will remain the animal's registration number. Also, by putting an animal on file with pedigree, Herdbook will show all trait and defect risk information so the member may know earlier possible trait or genetic condition risks. To learn how to put an animal on file, visit simmental.org/newmembers and follow the link to instructions.
- Make sure animals won't be put on genetic hold. AI sires, pasture sires, and donor dams can cause progeny to be put on genetic hold. If an animal is at risk for a defect, please call ASA ito discuss testing options.

Four Things Animal Ag Can Learn From the Human Response to COVID-19

When the COVID-19 pandemic started, many swine industry veterinarians stepped up and took part in conversations with human medical doctors to discuss herd immunity and brainstorm ideas for how to tackle this disease in humans.

Throughout the past year, many lessons have been learned. National Pork Board's Chief Veterinarian Dave Pyburn, DVM, shared four things he believes the livestock industry can take away from the human response to novel coronavirus during the Coalition for Epi Response, Engagement and Science (CERES) Biosecurity Infectious Disease Symposium at Colorado State University.

1. Get response plans and resources ready now.

Effective response plans and stockpiled resources need to be identified and ready to go on day one of an outbreak.

"In addition to plans and resources being readily available to deploy immediately when an outbreak occurs, it's critical that these plans and resources be tested over and over again in mock exercises first," Pyburn said.

It's important that people know what they are going to do when an emergency strikes. Mock exercises help people realize that no plan is ever perfect, and adjustments will need to be made along the way. But Pyburn said knowing this in advance will help us be better at a response as an industry.

2. Validated diagnostic tests are critical.

"Another thing I think that we can learn from the human side is that we will need validation of diagnostic tests, and the samples for those tests ahead of time," Pyburn said.

Although it was impossible to be prepared for COVID-19 since no one saw it coming, he believes we can learn lessons on diagnostic testing on the animal side.

"For the most part in the swine industry, we know those foreign animal diseases that are circulating around the globe that have a good chance of eventually coming here. So, let's get ready now," he said. "Let's have our tests ready."

3. Vaccines save lives.

Because the swine industry knows what's coming — as far as foreign animal diseases go — Pyburn said it's important to get vaccines ready now.

"Through research, let's get them effectively tested, and then let's get them stockpiled and ready to roll out in a time of need for response," he said.

4. Contact tracing will be essential to business continuity.

"We need to make sure that we can do contact tracing," Pyburn said. "It's hard to do on the human side, but I think as a veterinarian and working with the animal industries, we can do that better because of the ways our animals move and how they're permitted or tested to be able to move."

No one wants to see a foreign animal disease hit US soil. But Pyburn said there's a lot of things that can be learned from the human response to the COVID-19 pandemic to make animal agriculture's response to a foreign animal disease threat much more effective and efficient.

Livestock Water Quality Likely To Be Impacted

Having access to good-quality water is one of the limiting factors for cattle in most grazing systems.

"During a drought, this becomes an even greater challenge for producers as water sources decrease, creating water shortages and the potential for toxicity," says Miranda Meehan, North Dakota State University Extension Livestock Environmental Stewardship Specialist.

The quality of water has impacts on cattle intake and weight gain. Studies have reported improved gains by as much as 0.24 pound per day in yearlings and 0.33 pound per day in calves drinking good-quality water.

When surface waters become low, the mineral component of the water becomes more concentrated because minerals do not evaporate with the water. Of particular concern are increased concentrations of total dissolved solids (TDS) and sulfates, which can be toxic to livestock. For most classes of grazing livestock, the TDS in the water should be less than 5,000 parts per million (ppm).

Sulfate is part of the TDS. The recommended concentration should be less than 500 ppm for calves and less than 1,000 ppm for adult cattle. High levels of sulfates can reduce copper availability in the diet. Elevated levels of sulfates may cause loose stool, whereas very high levels of sulfates can induce central nervous system problems.

Ranchers should monitor TDS and sulfate levels throughout the grazing season because weather and other factors can influence water quality.

"We recommend the use of hand-held TDS meters as a quick method to screen water samples," Meehan says. "If the screening indicates the TDS is greater than 4,500 ppm, submit a sample to a lab for additional analysis."

Sulfate test strips are another tool to screen water samples. Both of these tools are affordable and easy to use, according to Meehan.

Drought also increases the risk for cyanobacteria (blue-green algae) blooms that can produce toxins that are harmful to livestock, wildlife and people. Toxicity is dependent on the species consuming the water, the concentration of the toxin or toxins, and the amount of water ingested.

The best method for monitoring cyanobacteria is visually. However, this can be difficult due to how rapidly a bloom can develop and ranchers' ability to check water frequently. One potential solution is to use a camera to monitor water locations.

If a bloom is observed, livestock should be removed immediately and a water sample should be submitted for testing. The sample can be evaluated microscopically for potentially toxic species of cyanobacteria, or the water can be analyzed for several of the toxins at commercial labs at a higher cost.

"As you develop your drought plan, it is critical to include strategies to ensure livestock have adequate, good-quality water," Meehan says.

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K-State Studies Effects of Transporting Cattle on Prices Paid at Auction

Kansas State University researchers have completed a large study of 211 livestock video auctions, analyzing the sale of more than 60,000 beef calf and feeder cattle lots to determine the effect of trucking distance on sale price of the calves.

The K-State team accessed data indicating the sale price of 42,043 beef calf and 19,680 feeder cattle lots sold through Superior Livestock Auctions from 2010 through 2018. Then, they analyzed sale prices based on how far the successful buyer had to transport the lot after sale.

Their four categories were: within state, short haul, medium haul, and long haul.

Not surprisingly, buyers who had a long way to travel to get cattle home paid less at the livestock auction, compared to those who had shorter trips home. In addition to fuel costs, producers who transport cattle longer distances assume a higher risk of illness and subsequent loss in performance due to stress on the animal.

The price difference was, however, not as wide as some might expect. For beef calf lots, in-state buyers paid an average of \$169.24 per hundredweight (cwt), while the data indicated the long-haul buyers paid \$166.70 per cwt.

For feeder cattle, the difference was also slight: in-state and short-haul producers paid \$149.96/cwt and \$149.81/cwt, respectively, while the long-haul producers paid an average of \$148.43/cwt.

"Over many years, research has shown there are many factors that can affect feeder cattle prices," said Karol Fike, a coauthor of the study and a faculty member in K-State's Department of Animal Sciences and Industry. "This work has allowed us to evaluate the effect of trucking distance on sale price while simultaneously accounting for many other factors that can affect the sale price. This work assists those involved in the beef cattle industry to make informed decisions."

Their study is part of a research publication that will be available during the 108th K-State Cattlemen's Day, which was held online March 5, 2021.

Ken Odde, professor of animal science and co-author of the study, notes that the research on cattle prices and trucking distance "is one study of many we have conducted using the Superior Livestock Auctions database. This database includes sales of calves and feeder cattle from most states in the country and has been used to study such areas as calf health programs, genetic programs, age and source verification and other attributes of feeder cattle lots. The trucking distance work is important in that it helps us and our audience to better understand factors influencing the sale price of calves."

K-State doctoral student Esther McCabe, who completed her degree in fall 2020, also helped with the research. ■

K-State Develops Management Minder Web Tool

Technology has been developed that makes many things in our lives much easier. (Some of you may remember when you were the remote control when your Dad was watching TV!) Now, new homes have heating, alarm, and lighting systems throughout that can be controlled remotely via smartphone. Cattle producers have not been left out of the tech boom: many use electronic IDs to automate data collection activities.

Our beef extension educational efforts often center on management topics. Some relate to time of year, while others depend on the individual operation's calving and breeding dates. So, while those suggestions are timely for most (we hope), they certainly do not fit everyone.

Taking advantage of available technology, producers now have a Management Minder. This web-based tool helps you add as many reminders for management topics to a yearly production calendar as you would like, all based on the specific times that you calve, go to grass, and wean in your operation. Examples include implementing nighttime feeding before calving starts to promote births during daylight hours; starting IGR mineral before fly populations are established; or ordering vaccines and supplies for weaning, pregnancy checking, or branding. Management Minder creates an ICS file that communicates dates and times to calendar programs in Outlook, Google, and Yahoo. The ICS file is sent to your email address and allows you to import the data into the appropriate calendar.

If you don't want to let underappreciated dates such as the start of the third trimester of gestation creep up on you, utilize the Management Minder to get it on your calendar. The program saves your dates, and, once set up, you can roll them into the next year. It is a great tool to communicate management plans to your veterinarian or other members of your team.

AJSA Membership: Before you start your registration (entry) for a Classic you need to be an active junior member. *Keep in mind: simply joining your state association is not enough!*

✓ Are you an AJSA Member?

- No: Go to juniorsimmental.org to find the AJSA Membership Application form. Become a Junior member **before May 1 to avoid a priority processing fee**. *Keep in mind: memberships received after 12 p.m. MT the same day as the entry deadline are not guaranteed to be completed prior to the deadline.*
- Yes: Is your Annual Service (ASF) paid for this year? Log into your Herdbook account. Select your Account tab, you will see Current if you have paid your ASF. If it says **Not Current**, call the ASA office to pay your ASF to bring your account to Current status.

Are the animals registered?

If you have the above taken care of, you should be ready to go online and register for the Regional and National Classic events.

- 1. Your membership number and password.
- 2. Registration numbers of all animals (up to 9 animals).

Deadlines: Register for the Regional and National Classics events as soon as possible to avoid late entry fees and priority handling fees.

Regional and National Classic EARLY entry deadline — 4:30 p.m. MDT (registration fees double after 4:30 p.m. MDT on April 29).

May 5 –

Regional and National Classic FINAL entry deadline — 4:30 p.m. Mountain

Use Our Online Herdbook

Herdbook Services offers hands-on registration capabilities.

You enter the data, work through any errors, pay the fees; registration will be completed in minutes. No priority handling fee, no hold-ups (unless there are errors or payment is needed) and can be completed any time of the day or night.

Interesting fact:

90.8% of the animal data is already submitted electronically through Herdbook Services!

Why the encouragement to go online and register the animal yourself?

- 1. Registrations and transfers needing faster than the normal turnaround will be charged \$50 priority processing fee per animal. This \$50 fee can be avoided by going online and completing the registration or transfer yourself.
- 2. Complete the registration online and if you need it mailed by FedEx or UPS send a request via email (simmental@simmgene.com) for special shipping. Note: there is a charge for shipping unless mailed by regular US Mail. Plan ahead and avoid those charges.

Need more encouragement to register online?

- 1. Normal processing (registration) on paper applications for SimGenetic animals (once received in the ASA office): 3-7 business days (error-free and payment received) depending on the time of year — holiday season could extend turnaround.
- 2. Mailing services: within three days of processing (registration) plus the length of time for the US Mail service.

The Customer Service Specialists are just a phone call away to assist you.

- 1. There are peak times and days where there are large volumes of calls (especially as it closes in on a deadline, you are not alone if you are one who waits until the last minute).

To help you plan, here are some items which may hold up registration for a length of time:

- 1. DNA / Genetic Abnormalities / Parental Validation / AI Sire / ET Requirements: DNA Testing is a standard process without any options to expedite this service.
 - a. Normal DNA Testing: 3-4 weeks for results. Sample
 - failure and misidentified samples doubles this time.
 - b. DNA kit paperwork requests: 48-hour turnaround
- 2. Non-Compliance:

Total Herd Enrollment breeders: there is a deadline each year where the previous year's calf data must be submitted. You'll be notified of the dams in your herd which need calf data or a reason the cow didn't calve when you go online to submit new registrations. Until this information is completed, no new data will be accepted.

3. Foundation Registration:

Sires registered with other breed associations MUST be registered with ASA prior to registering progeny. Other breed dams may be registered with ASA as a Foundation, but it is optional, not mandatory. Normal processing is 10-12 business days (error-free, payment received, DNA requirements completed).

4. Breeder Signature:

If the owner of the dam at the time of conception is different than the person applying for registration, ASA requires the breeder to sign off on the calf you are registering. Make sure the breeder signs the calf's registration application or breeding information is supplied on the transfer of the dam. If the dam was sold with the calf at side, make sure the seller has registered and transferred the calf to you.

5. Non-payment:

Payment is required to complete registrations.



Priority Handling Processing Service:

ASA offers priority handling services if you are unable to complete your registration online. If the data is error-free and payment is received, normal turn-

around time for registration is within two business days. There is a priority handling processing fee \$50 per animal. Regular US Mail service is at no charge; however, other mailing services (i.e. FedEx, UPS or Express Mail) will incur additional charges.
